Dear Ones,

It is my fifth Trillium season in your midst! Once again the first person to share with me a first seasonal sighting of a Trillium was Lori Green. This year that sighting was on March 10 in Arcata Forest. Because I was out of the area on vacation, I didn't get to see my first Trillium of 2017 blooming in Sequoia Park until my return on March 16, and once again I delighted at that first sighting! I love these beautiful white flowers with 3 petals standing up above 3 beautiful green leaves in our Redwood forests. I invite you to get out and see them for yourselves and see if you agree with me that they seem to be more plentiful this year.

I wonder, are there really more Trilliums this year, or does it just seem like more because until they pop up and bloom I'm never quite sure if they're coming back again. I suppose all the rain this year may have contributed to their abundance, or maybe it's related to how they are spread. I was surprised to read in a recent Times Standard caption that ants disperse the seeds of the Trilliums. ANTS! I do not think ants are among the creatures many of us think about when we declare the wonder of God's creation like the Psalmist: "O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the

earth is full of your creatures." (Psalm 104:24) Can thinking about the role of ants with the Trilliums cause us to pause before we bring negative judgment on other creatures? Including other human beings? Oh, we do live in a complex world, universe, God's creation!

The words from the book of Job that precede this letter remind me of a poem I once embroidered that said something like this, "What need we teach our child with our books and rules... let the child walk amongst the trees and flowers... let the child gaze upon the moon and stars and the child will have its wisdom." I invite you to get outside between or in the midst of the rain showers to "gaze upon" God's marvelous creation and contemplate the wonder, complexity, and surprises of it all!

Roll Down, Justice! Lenten Study

Pastor Kathryn continues to lead a Lenten Study, *Roll Down, Justice!* The study takes place on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 PM or Wednesday mornings at 10:00 AM. *Roll Down, Justice!*, written by Faye Wilson, is presented by the United Methodist Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR). It features music and reflections by Mark Miller of Drew University School of Theology and poses the following questions: What are you prepared to give up in order to have a closer walk with God? and What can you give in order to begin anew the work of justice? No materials need to be purchased for this study, and all are invited to attend On April 4 or 5 and April 11 or 12.

Eureka First UMC Walkers

PAL (Prayers and Letters) Partner

The Western Jurisdiction of the UMC elected Karen Oliveto, a lesbian woman, as Bishop in July 2016. She was



assigned to the Mountain Sky Area (Rocky Mountain and Yellowstone Conferences) in September. Bishop Oliveto has been warmly received by most of the churches and pastors of her

region, but her election has also been met with a complaint filed by another region of the UMC and some resistance to her leadership in her assigned region. The Judicial Council (the UMC's equivalent to the US Supreme Court) will meet in April to rule whether Karen Oliveto can be a bishop in the UMC.

Despite the overwhelming support for her within her conferences, some churches have lost members who cannot accept leadership from a lesbian bishop and have taken a subsequent financial hit from this. The churches of the Rocky Mountain and Yellowstone Conferences are seeing this as a critical time of witness to the meaning of the Church as the body of Christ loving and redeeming the world. As these churches carry on and hang in, they would appreciate the prayers of others and to know they are not alone. Bishop Karen Oliveto and the Western Jurisdictional Leadership Team are asking churches throughout the jurisdiction to be a PAL (Prayers and Letters) partner with at least one United Methodist Church in her leadership area for at least the next 3 months.

Eureka First United Methodist's PAL partner is Burlington UMC in Burlington, Colorado. Pastor Kathryn has spoken with Burry Bessee, the pastor of Burlington UMC, and learned some things about the church and community. The church has about 200 members, with weekly attendance below 60, down from 80-85 a year and a half ago. Burlington is a community of under 5,000, situated on the plains of Colorado and has experienced economic hardship following the closure of a prison in the area. Bishop Oliveto visited their church, as she has been visiting all the churches in her region, and met with about 15 persons. The pastor and others have been very impressed by their new Bishop.

We are all invited to be in prayer for the folks of Burlington UMC. In addition letters of encouragement from members of our congregation to members of their congregation would be appreciated. Christie Hall Needs a New Roof!

The current roof covering on the flat roof of Christie Hall, our education building, has been in place for at least 28 years – more than its expected life span. Over the years it has needed several repairs including one this past fall, but now it is time to fully replace it. The Board of Trustees have worked diligently obtaining engineering advice, securing bids from several contractors, and exploring financing possibilities.

Some folks in the church have wondered if rather than replacing the flat roof, a better long-term solution might be putting trusses on the building so that a conventional sloped roof might be installed. Advantages to this type of roof would be aesthetics, less chance of leaking, and less cost for roof replacement in the future. To explore this possibility engineer Steve Peacock volunteered his services to assess that Christie Hall could indeed support a trussed roof. Steve drew up some preliminary plans so that approximate costs could be ascertained for this major change. Based on costs of materials and labor, it appears such a major change to Christie Hall would cost approximately \$150,000.

The Board of Trustees and our Church Council are recommending a bid for a new flat roof that includes removal of the old roofing material and replacement with a PVC product that is guaranteed for 20 years (10 year workmanship guarantee). The bid for this project is \$47,238. The bid does not include any costs for repairs that may be needed when the old roof is removed. Because of this unknown the actual cost of roof repairs could be much higher (up to 20% more), and so the Finance Committee has explored how to finance up to \$60,000 for a new flat roof on Christie Hall.

Finance Chair Ralph Davis has researched and compared loan possibilities and he, along with the Church Council are recommending a loan be secured through the United Methodist Development Fund.

These recommendations by the Board of Trustees, the Finance Committee and the Church Council must be considered and voted on at a Charge Conference where all members of the church have the opportunity for input and vote. District Superintendent, Dave Samelson, has approved a special Charge Conference to be held on Sunday, April 23, following a 9:30 AM Worship Service for the purpose of moving forward with roof repairs and the financing of those repairs. All interested persons are invited to this special meeting.

Did you know Gerhard Drumm wrote a book?

Dear church family,

As many of you may already know, since his retirement my father, Gerhard Drumm, has been writing his life story. This book started out as a written legacy primarily for his children and grandchildren, but his children convinced him to make his book available to others as well because it is an amazing story. It tells of his family's survival and faithfulness during the years leading to and following WWII. In the first installment of his



autobiography, Gerhard Drumm describes his earliest memories of growing up in Northern Yugoslavia. It was a time and place when a two horse power machine was powered

by two horses, cars and radios were novelties and most people were farmers. He goes on to tell of how this community was affected by WWII and its aftermath. During this time, his entire family, along with about 10,000 other ethnic Germans in their town were forced from their homes, rounded up and imprisoned in detention camps. Miraculously, he and 4 of his siblings eventually escaped and arrived in Vienna as refugees. If you want to know more, you'll have to read his book, . You can buy a copy at Eureka Books on 2nd street in Old Town for \$16.00. A limited number of copies are also available at the church office for the same price. Gerhard Drumm plans to donate any profit from the sale of the book to organizations helping to new refugees.

Mexico House Building Mission

It takes three teams of folks to build a small house to improve the life of a family and its community in Mexico: the team that sends, the team that goes, and the team that receives. Once again Eureka First UMC is sending a team off to Mexico to build a house with AMOR ministries. This year's team that goes consists of 18 persons from or related to Eureka First UMC. Our team ranges in age from 15 to 69, with 5 youth and 2 adults participating for the first time as part of the team that goes.

The team that receives are the folks who work for AMOR ministries who have made all the arrangements in Mexico, will help us cross the border, guard our campground, prepare some of our food, and guide us in our work. Also receiving the team that goes is the family we will build a house for in Tecate, Mexico and the neighbors and community of that family.

The team that sends is all of you who will remain in Eureka, but have provided money to help support the financial requirements of this effort, have and will continue to support us with your prayers, and will send us off with **COOKIES!** This year we estimated that the costs of materials for the house we will build is about \$3000. This is in addition to the money participants are paying for food, transportation, and other expenses. To date \$1,740 of this has been received by the church. Please prayerfully consider whether you can contribute to this "second" mile giving.
