History Tidbit from Ann Hunt

Ann Hunt has prepared a record of EFUMC's past ministers, going all the way back to the first pastor appointed here. She has dug through archives and newspapers to collect what information she can find and organized it all into a binder for us. Thank you, Ann, for your labor of love! If you want to take a peek, stop by the church office. Here's one of the stories:

In the fall of 1920, the Rev. D.C. Lockwood was appointed to the Eureka congregation. He and his wife were Kansans, coming from an appointment in Oklahoma. At the age of 91, Edna wrote a 26-page memoir for her granddaughter. In it she writes of their arrival in Eureka, in late October. A copy of this manuscript is now in the possession of Lynn Intersimone and was passed down to her from her grandmother, Gladys Smith. Art and Glad Smith were members of the church and lived across the street from the parsonage. They remained life-long friends with the Lockwoods.

"... we arrived in Eureka after dark ... We had expected to be met, but no one approached us, so we got a room in the hotel. The next morning, we got a cab and went to the parsonage. A committee was in session wondering what they would do about the services the next day since the minister hadn't arrived. They had come to meet us but didn't recognize us as the 'preacher's family' ... They had not only gone to meet us, but had a hot meal ready for us and stocked the pantry with a few days' supply.

She continues: "The next day it <u>rained</u> hard, but the church was full. The church was beautifully decorated with dahlias. I had never seen such large ones. Some looked as large as a salad plate. The parsonage and church were in the old part of town, on 3rd St. ... It had ten rooms. One had been a small bedroom but was made into a bathroom. A larger room next to it was a storeroom. There were lines in it so

the clothes could be hung there to dry. The back stairs led from that to the kitchen. In the kitchen there was a cook stove made of brick and also a gas stove. There was a pantry between that and the dining room, but no heat in that part of the house. There was a down stairs bedroom and a front and back parlor. This was our sitting room, as it had a stove in it. ... Upstairs there was a study. There was a fireplace in it. Also one in the front parlor below. ... Since there had not been children in the parsonage, Daniel [2 &1/2] was made over by the church people. One woman asked him what he wanted for Christmas and he said a horn and a drum. She got both of them for him. I asked her what she had against me! "

AH: There had been children in the parsonage over the years, but perhaps not a young child and not for a while. I'd have to research that more. In the future, I'll share more of their experiences in their 3rd & H neighborhood.

Volunteers are needed to help the Eureka Emergency Overnight Warming Center

When our Northcoast weather gets severe, the community will open up an emergency warming center to help those with no place else to go. We monitor severe weather conditions throughout the winter season. When the weather is forecast to drop below 30 degrees, the Emergency Overnight Warming Center will be activated. Anyone from the community who is in need is welcome to spend the night. The Warming Center location will be on a rotating basis offered by faith-based community partners who are all located in the greater Eureka area.

How can I help?

Sign up to be placed on a text list. By signing up, you will receive a text when the Emergency Warming Center is activated requesting your assistance. You can reply directly and sign up to help in real-time.

Three to four (3-4) volunteers are needed from 6pm-7am when the Emergency Warming Center is activated. Limited shifts may be available. Your role will be to help monitor the space so guests can have a safe space to sleep. Training will be offered prior to your first shift. More details will be made available on training. [From your friendly editor]

A brief All-Advent meditation

On the 17th, I will be preaching in Klamath for the second time. There are plenty of challenges, but one of the more interesting is that this will be the only Christmas service held in that church this year. So I somehow have to cover all of Advent and get a solid push into Christmas, in one brief (okay, you all know me well enough to know that it won't be **that** brief) sermon and service.

I've been at a loss for how to handle this, but then yesterday everything came together in a sort of logic puzzle. So here is my All-Advent meditation that will form the core of my sermon.

We begin with the first candle of Advent. It's the candle of Hope. Why do we need hope? Because for many, the world as it is is intolerable. Imagine being in Israel or Gaza, trying to protect your family from terrors all around you. Imagine the mother, or brother, or sister, lamenting the death of a loved one shot to death by a crazed gunman. Closer to home, imagine the person huddle alone in a cold house—or a colder tent—with nothing to look forward to. And for all of us, imagine the climate perils facing our children and their children—what kind of world will they have? Oh, yes, we need hope.

But what do we hope for? That's the second candle, the candle of Peace. We need peace—not the peace of oppression, or the silence of tyranny, but the peace that lets each of us live to be our best, and promises the same for generations to come. We hope for a lasting and real peace.

But how do we achieve peace? That's the third candle, the candle of Love. Neither hate nor apathy can build a peaceful world. Each of us must learn to love, to truly love and care for each other, so that prosperity of some cannot come from the suffering of others. And so much of that means that we have to forgive. That's hard.

But when we love, what do we get for it? That's the fourth candle, the candle of Joy. We shouldn't confuse joy with "fun" or "entertainment." Joy isn't about having a good time. Instead, it is being complete and whole, and having that wonderful feeling of "rightness" because we know we are walking the way we are intended to walk.

And through all of this is the coming of Jesus, because Jesus is the way, and the truth, and the life. He's not the god who throws lightning bolts and punishes the wicked, although sometimes we want him to be that. Instead, he's the Son of God and Son of Man who teaches us how to live in a world where we bring hope to make peace through love, and are filled with the joy of the Spirit.

Amen.
